

After about a month and a half of working on the math problems and getting pledges, the SouthEast team raised a total of \$2,809.42! Mrs. Hubbs' goal was to raise \$500 and we raised over five times that amount.

Everyone received a math booklet of problems based on their math difficulty. Students completed the booklet and received points for each problem they had correct. This not only helped practice math skills but it also raised money for the St. Jude Children's Hospital.

To raise the money, contestants chose sponsors who pledged a certain amount of money per point or just a flat donation.
